New Advanced Adlerian Psychotherapy Certificate Available at the Adler School of Professional Psychology

In Fall 2008 a new certificate in Advanced Adlerian Psychotherapy was created to provide specialized training and knowledge in Individual Psychology. Many clinicians find the work of Alfred Adler and Individual Psychology while searching for a more comprehensive theory to conceptualize their clients and implement successful interventions.

Individual Psychology was created by Alfred Adler, and was further developed by Rudolf Dreikurs, one of the founders of this school. Adlerian Psychology has been one of the most important foundational theories in modern day psychology as evidenced by its influence in Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, Rational Emotional Behavioral Therapy, Existential Psychology, Humanistic Psychology, Solution Focused Therapy, and Systems Theories just to name a few.

This certificate, 26 total credit hours, exposes the student to numerous aspects of the theory. First, the student starts with the introduction or review of the tenets of the theory and psychopathology in the *Introduction to Adlerian Psychology and Psychopathology* class. Then, the student studies classic Adlerian parenting principles under the tutelage of current parent educators, which results in leading a parenting class in the community. Not only will students learn the basics of Lifestyle Assessment in *Lifestyle Analysis and Diagnosis* but will also acquire in-depth interpretative knowledge of it with the *Advanced Lifestyle* class. This summer, school founder, **Harold Mosak** plans to teach this class.

Historical interventions and techniques are taught in the *Adlerian Approaches to Individual and Family Therapy* course. Following this foundational class, *Advanced Adlerian Intervention and Theory* course explores Adlerian play therapy, group techniques, assessment with the BASIS-A, and analyzes the theoretical underpinnings to grief, guilt, and shame. Finally, there will be an elective course covering another subject domain with a focus on Adlerian principles. To heighten and advance the student's fund of knowledge, the student needs to complete a clinical practicum with a focus on Adlerian psychotherapy.

Furthermore, many of the courses are being converted to run as online and blended courses in an effort to reach out to Adlerians beyond the Chicago Metropolitan Area. The online and hybrid courses offer both students and faculty flexibility, convenience, and the opportunity to learn from others who could potentially be situated all over the globe.

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Manford A. Sonstegard Mentor, Author, and Friend

On Saturday, February 7, 2009, at 11:30 AM Eastern Standard Time, Manford A. Sonstegard, past President of NASAP, dear friend, colleague, and student of Rudolf Dreikurs, and a foremost expert in Adlerian group counseling died in Stow-on-the-Wold in County Gloucestershire in England. He was exactly two weeks and two days away from his 98th birthday, which he would have celebrated on February 23rd. He was married to Rita Sonstegard who was with him, and he is survived by three of his four children, Kirsten, Tamar, and Val. His first wife Ruth and his eldest daughter Karen both preceded him in death.

He was one of the first editors of *The Individual Psychologist*, and he held the position for the longest time. This journal was later incorporated into what is now *The Journal of Individual Psychology*. Sonste started and supported over 70 family education centers in the United States, Jamaica, Canada, and parts of Europe. He was the co-author of three books, *Living in Harmony with Our Children*, *Wages for Wee Folks*, and *Adlerian Group Counseling and Therapy: Step-by-Step*.

He had difficulty hearing for most of the last half of his life, and he turned it to his advantage as often as he could. He would consistently tell adolescents with whom he was fond of working that he needed them to speak up so he could understand them, and they would do it for him when they would not for others. Many of us have watched him counsel a family in conflict and seen him turn his hearing aids off until the fight was over, and then he would turn them back on and carefully, slowly help the family to sort life out and initiate a new harmony in their families.

I met Sonste when I was 27 years old and he was 63 years of age. I never dreamed that I would have him in my life for 35 years, over half of my life and more than a third of his. He has been my teacher, my confidant, my supporter and encourager, my substitute father, best friend, and greatest mentor. Some of you have known him even longer and been touched, as all who knew him were, by his gentleness of spirit, his dedication to work, and his love of everything Adlerian--his love of life and all the people in it.

Remembering Larry Nisan

Last summer, we in the Adlerian community lost one of our most dedicated and passionate advocates: Larry Nisan. We hope Christine, Elysia and Rory find comfort in knowing how he lives on in the many ways he transformed the lives of so many people during his most productive and joy-filled time with us.

Anyone who knew Larry, whether as a client, student, colleague or friend, has stories to tell about Larry. For both of us, his influence was important in our careers as Adlerian practitioners. For example, Linda was taking parent education classes from him in 1978, never having had much contact with Adlerian ideas before, when Larry asked her, "What do you want to do with all these classes you're taking?" Without having really thought about it, Linda answered, "I want to be a therapist like you, Larry." "Then come join my practice," Larry responded without a pause. And thus began Linda's involvement with the Adlerian community. He was a pioneer in using co-therapy as a psychotherapy training tool.

Alyson also studied with Larry. During her first day of practicum, he stopped mid-session and snatched her pad of paper from her hand where she had been nervously writing notes. Not knowing how to be a "useful" she was hiding behind the note pad and transcribing the sessions! He said "it's rude not to listen when a client is speaking" and then asked her opinion. As dumbfounded and shocked as she was, from then on, she felt like a co-worker instead of a student. She was made to feel she did have talents to contribute to a session even as a fresh-faced student. You had to be strong to work with Larry.

Larry trained dozens of physicians and graduates of Adler School of Professional Psychotherapy in his Dreikurs Centre and later in the Psychotherapy Institute of Toronto. He was a major factor in spreading parent education throughout Ontario through the Alfred Adler Institute. He was a tireless worker, always finding ways to spread Adlerian principles far and wide. He proposed educator Ray Corsini for a Nobel Peace Prize. Before his death, Larry was travelling regularly to Azerbaijan to establish Adlerian schools there.

Larry was skilled in making Adlerian theory memorable and practical. "What's the purpose of guilt?" he would ask his student co-therapist to explain. "Feeling bad about good

intentions you never had” would be the response, based on Dreikurs. Larry’s bombastic style and infectious belly laugh made him a formidable presence wherever he went. He was a loyal friend and good company, a storyteller, a musician, a writer, a rule-breaker, a wit, and a courageous adventurer. We surely have lost a vibrant member of our NASAP community.


